# **Editorial note**

Domestic Violence is one of the greatest problems in societies throughout the world. Both New Zealand and the Pacific Islands have high rates of family violence.

'1 in 3 (35%) New Zealand women have experienced physical and/ or sexual intimate partner violence (IPV) in their lifetime. When psychological/emotional abuse is included, 55% have experienced IPV in their lifetime.' (Fanslow & Robinson, 2011).

The National Council of Women New Zealand (NCWNZ) for many years have expressed their concern about the high statistics of family violence, and how to help alleviate the problem.

In 2018, the Joint Venture: Eliminating family violence and sexual violence project was established by government in response to family violence and sexual violence.

In this issue there are two articles about educational programmes that have been developed to help deal with the problems of domestic violence.

# Pihopa (Bishop) Wai reflects

Te Amorangi Ki Te Upoko o Te Ika (The Leadership of the Southern North Island)

### Working together

(via the Rev'd Tony Brooking, on behalf of Pihopa Wai)

Domestic Violence is a plague that does not discriminate. It takes many forms and knows no boundaries.

As the first Māori wahine (woman) Bishop in Te Pihopatanga o Aotearoa (The Bishoprics of New Zealand) I am looking to assist, promote and effect change to some of the horrific statistics impacting our communities, of which domestic violence is one.

White Ribbon is a worldwide movement started by a Canadian group in 1991 that has for many years brought to light the detrimental impact of domestic violence on all peoples and communities.

Since 2007 the campaign has been working here in New Zealand delivering a message of anti-violence towards women and children directly into our whānau (families) and communities.

Delivery at the coal face has been the preferred mechanism, asking men to challenge other men to begin and champion the change.

Here in our Amorangi, a collective whānau approach

has always been our preferred method, where men and women alike work together. To support the kaupapa *(guiding principles)* this year, this took the form of a community breakfast in one of our local areas, Highbury.



\*White Ribbon Riders

We were joined by the White Ribbon Riders (a group of women and men motorcycle enthusiasts), the local police, community groups and members from all walks of life.

The meal commenced with a real sharing which included resources, stories, experience and, at times, tears. It was concluded with hugs, smiles and hopes for better things to come. Better things may begin simply with an idea. Good ideas supported with positive action can become a reality not just for the here and now, but for the future.

Christ provides us with many examples of positive action -often as a means to challenge outdated structures.

As we look to new beginnings, let us turn to one of Christ's greatest commandments, and love our neighbours as we ourselves would like to be loved.

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# Did you know...

Some information about organisations dealing with domestic violence issues:

From White Ribbon's April Newsletter

'It is a difficult time for us as our funding relationship with ACC has now concluded. As a small player in the family violence space, we would argue that there is a need to engage in more educational campaigns.

With increasing rates of domestic violence and alarming surveys in Australia about the attitudes of young men (there is no equivalent NZ survey), we are committed to finding a way forward so that we can keep educating and challenging men's attitudes with the aim of reducing men's violence towards women.'

### From Aviva's May Press release

'Since COVID-19, Aviva has seen over a 30% spike in family violence referrals – it started with the NZ lockdown, but didn't end when it was over. Economists' predictions spell bad news for Aotearoa's most vulnerable, and for the charities that support them.

Even before the pandemic, New Zealand had the highest rates of intimate partner violence and child abuse in the OECD. And housing insecurity, a rising cost of living, and job instability – while never an excuse for violence – are common stressors which cause it to rise.

Since we came out of lockdown we have closed to 'non-urgent' referrals for most of the year. We have reopened three times and in less than three weeks we were overwhelmed again. Charities like Aviva rely on philanthropy and private donations to support the number of clients that they do - including many who do not qualify for government funding. We're already noticing the impacts as the average donation amount has halved Ultimately, while the cycle of family violence remains unbroken in our society, we know the number of individuals and families needing help will continue to grow. In order to create safer homes and futures. for our Tamariki (children), everyone needs to join us.'

### From Women's Refuge May Report:

'We undertake original research



projects on domestic violence issues in New Zealand, to help us find ways to improve the safety and well-being of New Zealand women and children.

### Current projects and reports:

**Intimate Partner Stalking** 700 respondents were involved in this study.

### Pet Abuse Report

Animals are both a source of comfort and a source of vulnerability.

### **Reproductive Coercion**

This study looked at partner behaviours during all aspects of pregnancy.

### **Economic abuse report**

This survey involved 445 women who considered themselves to have been victims or potential victims of economic abuse by partners.'

### Review: *Out of the Blue* by Mary Redmayne

I'm glad I read this. It is impossible to approach a book about grief without bringing our own darker experiences to the reading, and the author wisely takes this into account. She gives space for writing down the reader's personal responses and suggests support music for the difficult process. The playlist is an invaluable resource. The book is deceptively slight for the weight of its subject, and allows the eye to travel thoughtfully from one simple photo of trees and water to another, and from one sentence to the next 1 enjoyed the practical reality of some comments as well as their linking to biblical and philosophical words. Each reader in this way makes an individual journey yet is accompanied by the author, codiscovering a possible peace. The Association of Anglican Women (AAW) is an important contributing member of the National Council of Women (NCWNZ) which is often referred to as an umbrella organisation, representing a wide range of views and organisations including AAW and other religious denominations.

Should the organisation be seen more as a platform organisation, perhaps a springboard for the viewpoint of all women of Aotearoa? The point has been raised that it is difficult to be truly representative of all women.

There was discussion of the possibility of having no fees for membership to encourage

growth and diversity of membership so that all sectors of New Zealand society can be represented.

The 'digital divide' remit received some of the greatest feedback from AAW members with real concern about different sectors of society being excluded from the digital world.

Julie adds, "I would love to hear of initiatives for social change that your AAW members are involved in."

Although parishioners had affiliated themselves to four churches in the Hutt Valley, several of our members were enjoying attending AAW afternoon meetings at St James as well as our evening meetings in members' homes.

The membership of both our groups was in decline through natural attrition, so we could see amalgamation of the groups would provide

We approached the Rev'd Peter Benge, vicar of St James and Sue Barlow, the Coordinator of the St James' Women's Group. Both supported us. Our Diocesan leader Mary Driver was delighted.

The Rev'd Peter Benge was unable to be present at either of the AGMs so wrote to us this letter to be read out by the clergy who were chairing the meetings:

"I am really grateful to God for this decision to strengthen the life of the AAW branches of Holy Trinity and St James by making them one. A key value of our parish is togetherness, and we appreciate all efforts



to come together and work together. Jesus himself prayed before His crucifixion that his followers might be one. "There is strength in numbers, strength in agreement, and strength in unity. While there may be a sense of loss of a group's individual journey, there are all sorts of gains in being together.

"In fact, when I first heard your plan to amalgamate, I thought of a braided river, where the waters diverge for a while and then they come back together. Holy Trinity and St James used to be one parish. Then for a while there were two parishes, two or more

women's groups which were supportive of each other but separate. And now today the two channels of water have come back together, and I believe you will strengthen each other by doing that. "I pray that the flow of your life in God will deepen as you come together for this next stage of your journey."

#### The House of Sarah: report supplied by the Rev'd Sereima Lomaloma

#### 'Sarah Carers'

The House of Sarah, through the Sarah Carers provides a referral service for women in the community. A Sarah Carer 'provides a listening ear, a helping hand and a warm heart' to whoever is in need. Currently there are about 20 Sarah Carers in 11 parishes and three more from one other parish are waiting to be commissioned. From March 2019 when they began, they saw or spoke with 100 women in that year alone. In 2020 there were an additional 124 clientele.

It is becoming obvious that the ministry offered by Sarah Carers is slowly being accepted. Sarah Carers work with other providers such as the Fiji Women's Crisis Centre, Medical Services Pacific, Empower Pacific, the Police, and the Department of Social Welfare.

### Preventing violence against women and girls during the COVID-19 pandemic:

Since October 2020, the German Embassy in Wellington has been partnering with the House of Sarah to raise awareness in the community on the importance of preventing violence against women and girls during the COVID-19 pandemic. These workshops have been held in Nabunikadamu, Waidradra, Sigatoka, Wainaloka and for the young people in Suva.
